CHRVA Alumnus Played in Rio

Did you know that a CHRVA alumnus played in the Olympics? I am talking about <u>Aaron Russell</u>, the the 6' 9" Outside Hitter who wears #2 for Team USA.

Back when he played in CHRVA, he was a middle hitter for MVP (Maryland Volleyball Program). He was a dominant force surrounded by a wonderful team. But during his time at Centennial High School, Aaron actually was a soccer star since there was no Boys volleyball there. His family was filled with volleyball players, so Aaron played outdoor with his family and was in the gym whenever he could be.



After high school he played for Penn State where he transitioned to being an Outside Hitter.

In 2014 Aaron joined the Men's USA National Team. In fact, he was the leading scorer in the final three matches of the 2015 FIVB World Cup as the US won and qualified for the 2016 Olympic Games. His professional time this year was with the Italian club Sir Safety Perugia.

His dad, Stew, is now a coach for the Annapolis Volleyball Club. One day back in May before a Junior club practice that Aaron could not attend, his dad asked Aaron and his fiancée, Kendall Pierce, who was a libero/back row specialist for Penn State, what they would tell the U-14 boys if they could be at the practice. They said:

- 1. Play and watch as much volleyball as you can;
- 2. Energy is as important as skill; and
- 3. You're always part of the play.

What perfect advice for young players and applicable to the highest levels of volleyball.

Aaron and his youngest brother, Paul, met up at the Boys Junior Nationals in the Dallas convention center this year. Paul was there playing 16U in Hall C and Aaron was there competing for Team USA in the arena. Family gatherings are always great!

And now Aaron has played for Team USA in Rio! Congratulations, Aaron! The Chesapeake Region is proud of you and your team's accomplishments.

Outdoor Program Update

CHRVA BEACH PLAYERS JOINING THE COLLEGE RANKS

Beach volleyball in the Chesapeake region is growing at a tremendous rate. When Stevenson University began its beach program, the coaches looked to their indoor players such as Annika Schwartz (MVSA VBC) to staff their beach team. But as NCAA beach volleyball began to expand and our beach program started to develop, more players focused their efforts on making a collegiate beach team. Samantha Harris and Shannon Williams become the first two D-1 players from our area. Caroline Skaff will follow in their footsteps as she starts her collegiate beach volleyball career at the University of South Carolina.

In 2016, Samantha Harris represented Stetson University in the first ever NCAA Beach Volleyball National Championships. She played the #4 seed. Shannon Williams, also a freshman last year, played as the #1 seed for the University of South Carolina. All three players trained at Dulles Volleyball while also playing indoor club volleyball during their senior year of high school.

While most beach players play beach only in college, this year four players will be participating in both indoor and beach at the Division I level. Angela Tender (Dulles 18-1) will be competing at UNC-Wilmington. Lauren Twitty will be a freshman at the University of New Mexico University and Giogio Borgiotti will be attending Florida Gulf Coast University. Also in the 2016 class is Abby Harry (NVVA) who will be playing both sports at the University of Central Arkansas. In 2017, Hailey Rubino will be joining Lauren Twitty at New Mexico. Lauren, Giogio and Hailey played for Metro Volleyball Club.

Also in 2017 is Savannah Siegrist who will be competing for the beach volleyball program at Jacksonville University. Being one of the best beach volleyball players for South River Volleyball Club, she was able to partner up with various players from different clubs to get the recruiting exposure she needed.

Although most beach volleyball programs were started by Division I programs, more and more non-Division I programs will be offering beach volleyball. In the 2016 class, Darian Hileman will be attending Stevenson University to play both indoor and beach. Stevenson University is the first Division III school to offer beach volleyball. They compete against other Division I schools as well as NAIA schools. At the NAIA level, Kelly Hughes will be attending Missouri Baptist University as an indoor and beach player. In the 2015 class, Dawson Boese from CHRVA competed at the NAIA level for Webber International University.

CHRVA JUNIORS COMPETE AT USAV NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Historical Background: In 2011, when I took on the role as the CHRVA Coordinator for Outdoor Volleyball programs, less than 30 juniors played the sport. At the time, juniors played only a couple sand tournaments and a few grass tournaments during the summer. In most cases, players learned the game on their own or had parent-players who introduced them to the sport.

Some of the boys in Northern Virginia were the first to participate in the National High Performance program. They were selected to participate in the A2 camps in Florida and California in 2012. A few of our girls joined the boys in A2, A3, and Regional HP programs in 2013. Since then, several girls from region have been offered scholarships to play sand volleyball in college. On the boys' side, one boy has been selected to represent the U21 USA National Beach team at the FIVB world championships in Lucerne, Switzerland. We are striving to develop high level players such as these athletes.



Clubs in Northern Virginia were the first to start beach program training for juniors. No Panic Volleyball offered the first clinics for juniors. They were followed by programs offered by Coach Steve (Reston, Virginia), Dulles Volleyball (Sterling, Virginia), Evolution (Alexandria, Virginia), NVVA (Sterling, Virginia) and South River (Annapolis, Maryland). The advent of beach volleyball as an NCAA sport and a very successful Olympic year (2012) propelled growth in the sport.

In the region, National and Regional HP programs helped further develop our juniors. The Junior Beach Tour (JBT) followed the HP programs offering juniors additional opportunities to compete nationally. Some CHRVA juniors partnered with their A2 friends from around the nation to play other national qualifiers. Each year, our player's participation, skill and commitment has continued to increase. The top players in our region are playing at an open level and competing in over 10 tournaments each year.

2016 Successes and Results: This year, clubs all across the region have begun showing success in developing strong players. Brandywine (Delaware) and DVL's Ocean City Beach Club (Ocean City, Maryland) have now joined in producing highly skilled players, thus expanding the talent across the region. In 2016 we've also seen the growth in number of players to make Regional and National HP programs. Despite our growing success, we still struggle against A1 and A2 HP National teams. We are however claiming top finishes in other national events such as in the JBT. Some of the records are listed below:

BEACH HIGH PERFORMANCE

With 104 nets strung across the Rehoboth Beach sand for the First Rites of Summer Beach Tournament, we knew the turnout for the USAV and CHRVA High Performance beach team tryouts would be significant. Congratulations to those players that stood out among the crowd and made either the USAV or our regional Beach HP teams.

The GJNC (Girls Junior National Championships) started in April in Milwaukee, Wisconsin with the 18 Open and the 18 National Divisions. Our Chesapeake Region sent three teams to this Championship event. The Metro 18 Travel Team competed in the 18 Open Division and finished 22 out of 36 teams. We also had two teams compete in the 18 National Division: MD JRS 18 Elite (finished 27 out of 48 teams) and Arlington Elite 18 (finished 46 out of 48 teams).

For the GJNC in Indianapolis in June our region saw 18 of our other age level teams compete! Starting with some of our youngest teams to our oldest teams we saw a lot of great play and great experiences.
